LING 3-225 SECOND LANGUAGE ACQUISITION

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Course description and objectives

This course introduces students to the field of second language acquisition theory. After a brief overview of first language acquisition data and theories, as well as types of bilingualism, the course focuses mainly on the following.

- 1. First language acquisition theories (Behaviourism, Universal Grammar, Interactionism)
- 2. Second language acquisition theories (Behaviourism, Universal Grammar, Monitor Model, Interactionism, Information processing, Connectionism).
- 3. Factors affecting second language learning (e.g. intelligence, aptitude, personality, learning styles, motivation and attitudes, beliefs).
- 4. Age of acquisition and the critical period hypothesis.
- 5. Interlanguage (contrastive analysis, error analysis, developmental sequences, first language influence, fossilization, avoidance, vocabulary, pragmatics, phonology).
- 6. Learning contexts (natural vs. instructional environment, traditional vs. communicative instruction)
- 7. Types and effect of corrective feedback.

Assessment: Final written exams.

Learning outcomes and competences

By the end of the course participants should be:

- 1. Familiar with second language acquisition as an independent study field.
- 2. Aware of the similarities and differences between First and Second Language Acquisition.
- 3. Able to critically evaluate second language acquisition theories.
- 4. Familiar with the concept of interlanguage.
- 5. Aware of the differences between various second language acquisition contexts and types of learners, as well as how these differences may affect language learning.
